Both tutorials are really about the best practice of producing a memorable canvas. Lanfranco guides you through the materials you need to set up, including a peeler, scissors, and a filter bar, and clearly walks you through the process of cutting your canvas properly and attaching it to the bar. Priming comes next: using gesso will create a flexible surface that receives paint well and allows you to deploy it more effectively. Lanfranco outlines materials for the process, including gesso, berus gesso, and sand paper (for sand below the surface after each kot, so that the canvas is smooth and ready for painting)—and takes you through step by step with easy-to-follow instructions. At the end of the course, you'll have a canvas ready to paint. Interested in trying or trying to improve your acrylic painting skills? On his YouTube channel, artist Will wrote and created his own videos on classical painting techniques, with a focus on the use of acrylic paint. Whether you're just getting started or have a more aspiring project in mind, Will's video will various strategies for medium. Founded in 1929, the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) houses some of the most famous modern paintings in the world.
